## PAPER PILOT CERTIFICATES

As seen in SOARING, March 2010

14 CFR 61.91(h) explains the duration of pilot certificates. It concludes, "the holder of a paper pilot certificate issued under this part my not exercise the privileges of that certificate after March 31, 2010."

This means that you cannot fly as PIC with a paper certificate in your possession (this does not apply to temporary and student certificates.)

For online processing, go to <u>http://www.faa.gov/licenses\_certificates/</u> Go to <u>www.faa.gov</u> for USPS mail processing instructions.

There is a fee for the new plastic certificate. However, explore the links about having your certificate number changed from your SSN to some other number. That's free and replaces your paper certificate.

Still confused? Ask a CFIG.

Exciting news for the upcoming season at Sunflower! Thanks to a little prodding from Andrew I am now an official SSA Instructor. What does this mean for you? It means that I now have the power to issue A, B, C, and Bronze badges! We've all seen the list of A, B, and C badges issued in the back of Soaring but I've noticed a lack of people in Kansas making that list. Let's change that this season!

#### A little history lesson

The badge tradition goes back to the 1920's in Germany. Original requirements for an A badge were two flights of at least 45 seconds and a flight with two S turns lasting at least 60 seconds. Keep in mind this was likely done in a primary glider after a bungee launch. The first B Badge required a figure eight pattern of two 360 degree turns, one left and one right, to be accomplished after a bungee launch. The original C badge was the first soaring award and required a flight of 5 minutes after launch. Doesn't sound like much but keep in mind that through most of the 1920's the world record for duration was less than 10 minutes!

The SSA introduced the ABC Badge program in the US in 1962 as a way to encourage students by setting goals for them to achieve.

#### Present day

Current A Badge requirements are as follows: Applicant has an FAA Pilot Certificate and a Logbook

- Applicant demonstrates knowledge of: Sailplane nomenclature
- Handling procedures
- Pre-flight check
- Airport rules and FAR's
- Tow equipment, signals, and procedures
- Hook up of towline, launch signals and pilot responsibilities.

Applicant has completed the following training:

- Familiarization flight
- Cockpit check
- Effects of controls

- Takeoff procedures including crosswind takeoffs
- Flight during tow
- Straight glides
- Shallow turns
- Landing patterns
- Landing procedures including downwind and crosswind landings
- Moderate and steep banked turns
- Stall recognition and recovery
- Conditions of spin entry and recovery
- Effective use of spoilers/flaps/slips
- Emergency procedures
- Pass an oral exam on FAR's
- Complete their first solo flight

Achieving the A Badge completes the Preflight and Presolo phase of training and any pilot who wears an A Badge tells the world that they have soloed!

The B Badge motivates the pilot to start practicing soaring flight. The requirement to achieve the B Badge is to complete a 30 minute solo flight after release from a 2000 foot tow. This shows that you have basic soaring ability. If you take a tow higher than 2000 feet, add 1.5 minutes for each extra 100 feet.

The next phase in the soaring pilot's training is pre-cross country. This is where we really learn to soar. To earn the C Badge, the pilot must complete the following:

- Take dual soaring practice, including instruction in techniques for soaring thermals, ridge, and wave.
- Have knowledge of cross country procedures, Sailplane assembly, disassembly, and retrieves, and the hazards of cross country flying.
- Log 2 hours of solo flight time
- Soar for 60 minutes after release from a 2000 foot tow. Like the B Badge, add 1.5 minutes for each extra 100 feet.
- While accompanied by an SSA Instructor, make a simulated off field

landing without reference to an altimeter and perform an accuracy landing coming to a complete stop within an area no greater than 500 feet in length.

By the time you have passed your private pilot checkride, you should have completed all the requirements for the A, B, and C badge!

The next badge, the Bronze Badge, is the highest badge awarded by the SSA and indicates that the pilot is ready to go cross country to work on the FAI badges (Silver, Gold, and Diamond). Requirements for the Bronze Badge are as follows:

- Complete the ABC program
- Log 15 hours solo in glider, including 30 solo flights and at least 10 of those flights in a single place glider
- Log 2 flights, each having a duration of two hours or more
- Perform three solo spot landings, witnessed by an SSA Instructor.
- Log dual time with an instructor and perform two accuracy landings without reference to an altimeter
- Pass a closed book written exam on cross country techniques and knowledge.

I'm really excited about being an SSA Instructor and I'm hoping to give out a lot of badges this season. One thing to note, even if you are not a student pilot you still can earn your A, B, C, and Bronze badges! If you've accomplished the required tasks you deserve to be recognized for it! I'm happy to give a Bronze Badge written test anytime that is convenient and actually wouldn't mind putting together some sort of Bronze Badge training class sometime. Maybe we could spend an afternoon studying and then everyone could take the test. If we did it out at Sunflower we could do the required flight training then too. This is starting to sound like fun!

For me, the best thing about the badge program is that it is graduated and gives you something to keep working towards. In fact, that is really my favorite part about the sport of soaring. No matter how high or far or fast you fly, there is always another level of achievement out there to try to achieve. A quick note to the other instructors in the club:

You too should become an SSA Instructor. This way any of the club students can fly with any of the club instructors to achieve the requirements for the badges. Its easy to do, you just need to be an SSA member, have a minimum 50 hours of glider time in 100 flights, and have earned a Bronze Badge or higher.



"I recently found a book titled "McConnell Air Force Base" by Steve Larsen, ISBN 978-0-7385-6183-7 and on the cover is a B-47 making a JATO assisted take off from McConnell AFB. Since Curt McNay flew those tests at Boeing at that time I am positive that is Curt in the Cockpit. All the old timers I have talked to say that has to be Curt. Curt was almost killed in these tests when the rockets burned all the skin off the bottom of the aft fuselage, when he landed only the stringers were holding the tail on."

Some of us only knew Curt as the gentleman glider pilot. But he had a long, distinguished flying career long before sharing his company with us at Sunflower - and some harrowing experiences too. - 3T

Please cut them out so that they are all the same size.


